

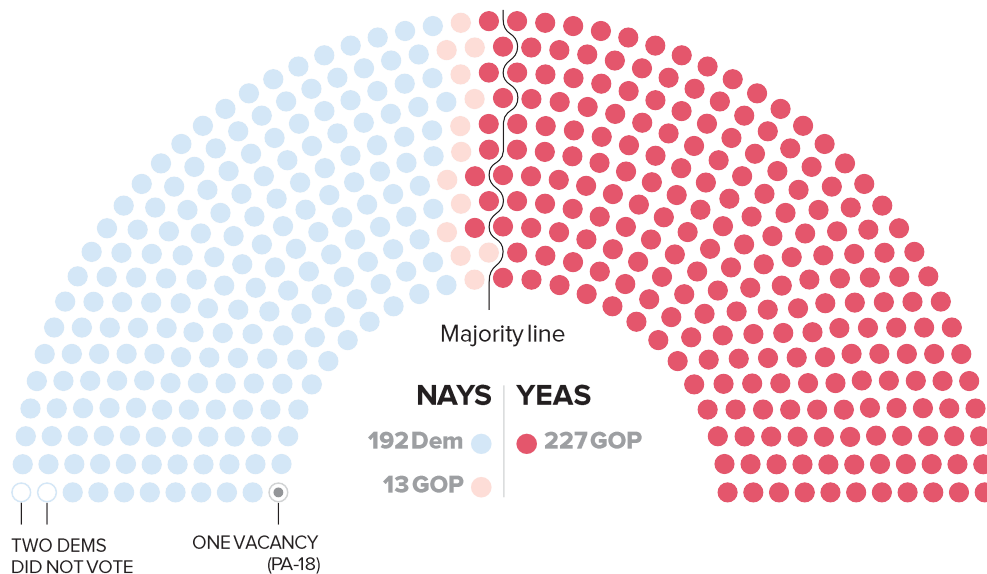

House Votes 227-205 to Pass Tax Cuts and Jobs Act

The House passed its tax bill mostly on party lines with a 227-205 vote, a major legislative win for Speaker Paul Ryan and the White House. Thirteen Republicans voted no, many of them moderates in blue states who opposed repealing deductions for state and local income and sales taxes. The SALT deduction is especially popular in areas with high income and property taxes. Some of those 13 Republicans represent districts where more than half of filers claim the SALT deduction. All Democrats voted no, with two not voting — Reps. Mark Pocan (D-Wis.) and Frederica Wilson (D-Fla.).
